TWITTER

Twitter

We hear about politicians who use Twitter, celebrities who use Twitter, and maybe more than a few friends. What's the big deal?

Twitter (www.twitter.com) is a simple tool. You type a description of what you are up to, right at that moment, using 140 characters or less. Twitter sends that information to all of your friends, family, and co-workers who sign up to follow your updates. (They generally see your Twitters on a special Web page.) This bare-bones idea seems to have captured the imagination of the Internet.

Twitter relies on cell phones for much of its spontaneity. That's where the 140-character rule comes from—it's close to the typical mobile phone text message limit. You can send your "tweets" to Twitter via text messaging on your cell phone or by filling in a form at the Twitter Web page. Third-party sites can also feed Twitter by email.

The goal is to make it easy for you to update your Twitter status anywhere, anytime. You've never been so well-informed about what your friends do all day. What's more, you can get those updates wherever you go. You can view other users' updates via text messages that are delivered to your phone; you can read them at the Twitter Web site; or you can view them through a variety of other applications.

Not all users update constantly about mundane goings-on. Some users send out periodic witticisms or use Twitter as a short-form entertaining blog. Many people don't understand the point of Twitter, and that's OK. It probably depends on whether other people you know use Twitter. It

can be a fun way to keep in touch with a closeknit bunch of family members or friends.

Twitter Time

Try out Twitter for yourself by heading to the site and clicking the Get Started Now button to sign up. Enter your name and email address and choose a user ID and password. The next page will search Twitter for the contacts stored in your email account, if you are comfortable with handing your email password over to Twitter. If not, you can skip that step and locate friends one at a time.

Next, the site suggests some actual Twitter users you could begin following (automatically receiving tweets from them) to get in to the swing of things. Often, these are famous folks you probably do not know personally.

Just as you can follow other Twitter users, celebrity or otherwise, Twitter users can become your followers. Generally, you only see tweets from people you follow, and only your own followers see what you send. To start following friends, click Find People near the top of the Twitter page. Here, you can locate people already on Twitter or send emails inviting others to try Twitter.

Once you're set up, go to the main page and type out your first update. Even if you don't have any followers, it will show up on the Everyone tab along with, well, everyone else's tweets.

Focused Conversation

Along with the standard tweet blasts, Twitter lets you send other types of messages. You can send a reply to someone by beginning your

Base64 Encoding

Question:

When I wonder whether to open an email message because it could contain a threat, I look at the source. Occasionally I can't read the code because it is "base64 encoded", according to the HTML. What does that mean, and are there tools I could use to view the source?

The Short Answer:

Base64 is a way of coding email in plain text which appears to be random characters.

Among the many decoders available, Shell Tools offers a particularly simple online form: http://www.shell-tools.net/?op=base64_dec

Just copy the encoded text (easy to spot, often ending with equal signs), paste it into the input box, and click Submit. The web page then displays the source in plain text.

Base64 Details

Base64 is a scheme of representing data as plain printable text to avoid modification and side effects which could occur if special characters such as in foreign languages were interpreted as control characters during transmission.

The process of common base64 email encoding involves considering each block of three bytes (24 bits) as four codes of six bits each, which are then output as four bytes. Thus, the length of the encoded text tends to be a third larger than the original, and cannot be justified in terms of space conservation.

A byte is eight bits - a character, as we used to say. (A bit is a binary digit, either 1 for true or 0 for false.) Nowadays, in Unicode, multi-byte characters, such as four-byte characters, are common in some alphabets.

Layers of Code

Note that base64 is encoding of some other encoding which could be Unicode. (And the Unicode is typically encoded HTML (HyperText Markup Language) which is the code used in most web pages.) Although UTF-8 (Unicode Transformation

Format 8, the most common email Unicode) is capable of handling variable-width characters, US English UTF-8 is plain text.

And although base64 can be used to encode any type of data, such as images, the guestion above concerns HTML source code, which already tends to contain only plain text for messages in English. In such cases, when there is no technical justification for encoding, base64 is sometimes used to elude less sophisticated spam filters, since the text does not appear to contain any words that can be recognized.

A Base64 Example

An example of an email message in UTF-8 English base64 came from Acronis, the maker of the excellent True Image Backup program. The subject is 'Webinar: Government Sets Hard Deadline for Healthcare IT'. For more information, see www.acronis.com/pr/2009/05/26-05-51.html

Thunderbird, as any modern email client should, does a fine job of decoding the Acronis message. But the question above is about viewing the source before opening the message, since this message is not about Acronis products, and could conceivably be a phishing scam.

The Acronis message includes **ICAgQXJIIHlv** dSBsb29raW5nIGZvciBleHBlcnQg which is code for Are you looking for expert'

The four bytes ICAg represent the three leading spaces, which might not be intuitive at first glance.

Numeric Conversion

As the name indicates, the base64 encoding scheme uses the base 64 numbering system.

(The decimal system is base 10, and contains ten digits: 0-9. The binary system is base 2, and contains two digits: 0-1. The hexadecimal system is base 16, and contains 16 digits: 0-9 and A-F.)

For email encoding, the base 64 numbering system contains the 64 digits represented as the 26 capital letters, the 26 lowercase letters, the 10 decimal digits, the plus sign, and the slash:

A-Z a-z 0-9 + / 0-25 26-51 52-61 62 63

Each base 64 number is a six-bit binary number ranging from 0 to 63 (binary 000000 - 111111).

In addition to the characters corresponding to the base 64 numbers, encoded data may be padded with equal signs (=), which must be included as input to decoders.

The table below shows the first four bytes (ICAg) of coded text, the binary representation, the hexadecimal, the base 64 number (ICAg), the decimal index codes, the six-bit binary equivalents, the same 24-bits considered as three bytes, the equivalent hexadecimal, and the decoded text (three spaces):

Free Downloads

In addition to many online forms for encoding and decoding, there are numerous free programs that can be downloaded. I tried a couple.

The Elcro Base64 Encoder/Decoder requires no setup:

http://elcro.com/base64encdec.aspx
When I ran the program, my firewall (in Eset
Smart Security) alerted me that the program was
trying to communicate with a site in Croatia. Since there is no reason for the program to
contact a server, I checked Remember, and Deny
(to never connect). The program works fine
without connecting.

The Base64 De-/Encoder by Fatih Kodak also requires no setup:

http://f2ko.de/English/

This is a command line utility, which can be quite useful in setting up custom tools. The site contains several programs that might be interesting to Do-It-Yourself fans.

Many sites offer source code for code tools written in various computer languages, for incorporating into your own applications.

Decoding is Easy

Encoding is an annoyance, but whether used for technical reasons or obfuscation, can be read as plain text.

I will eat healthier. I will exercise more. I will feel better.

With the Nike + iPod Sport Kit, you can sync your workouts with NikePlus.com where you can set fitness goals, build routines, and track your progress. This has been my New Year's resolution for the past five years, and I know I'm not alone. Every January, I see new members joining my gym, and for the first few months, it's hard to find an open treadmill.

By May, the crowd thins out, and yoga class attendance is down. I am as guilty as the rest of them.

I have one major distraction when it comes to reaching my fitness goals: I simply get bored. Excuses, excuses. But, I need to mix up my routine to stay interested. So, I've started integrating tech devices into some of my workouts. iPod tunes certainly help jumpstart my workout sessions, but I've found other fun ways that inspire during that last lap. If you, too, need a little motivation, here are a few ideas that might help give you that extra push.

ThinQ. If you enjoy walking, a pedometer really motivates you to take those extra steps. Each pedometer is a little different in the way you wear it and the information it measures, but all are designed to track steps and distance. I like Sportline's ThinQ (\$29.99; www.sportline.com). About the size of a credit card, it's designed to fit in your pocket rather than clip to your waistband. I like this concept

because I know it's there, but no one else does. The ThinQ tracks steps, distance, and calories burned. If you've never worn one, I encourage you to try a pedometer—you might be surprised at the number of miles you're putting on every day.

Nike + iPod. I'm counting on the Nike + iPod Sport Kit (\$29; www.apple.com) to help me complete my first half-marathon this spring—and so far, I'm not disap-

pointed. Compatible with all iPod nanos and the iPod touch (second generation), the kit includes a sensor that you place in the sole of a Nike + shoe (shoes sold separately). The sensor communicates with a receiver attached to your nano (the 2G iPod touch has built-in support, so no receiver is needed). You select from a list of workouts and receive audible feedback of your distance, pace, time, and calories burned. Once a workout is completed, you connect your nano or touch to your computer, which will sync with iTunes and send your workout information to NikePlus.com where you create an account to set your goals and track your progress. Overall, this kit is a great motivator; plus, it's a great excuse to buy a new pair of kicks.

Wii Fit. My roommate is the proud owner of a Nintendo Wii (\$250; www.nintendo.com), and Wii Fit (\$89.99) was one of the first accessories (Continued on page 15)

Google's open source operating system

There is a new laptop operating system on the horizon that just might give Microsoft some serious competition. It is a re-make of Googles open source Android operating system presently used on Mobil Phones.

Because the Android Laptop operating system is just starting I have left the supposition of where it will go for the end of this article. In a year or less a re-examination of this article will tell if I got it right.

THE HISTORY

In 2005 Google acquired a small Palo Alto Co. called Android. This company made software for mobile phones. This started rumors that Google was going to expand into the mobile phone business. While it was unclear just what Google would do in this market, the rumors persisted.

In 2006 the news media reported Google was working on ways to get its search application on mobile phones. The rumor was that Google was working on a Google phone as a prototype for manufacturers.

In 2007 Google launches Android. It turns out that their interest was focused on a mobile phone operating interface with all of the software to run a mobile phone instead of an actual Google phone.

In 2009 Google makes available Android's open source operating system for laptop manufacturers.

Acer the number two laptop manufacturer puts Anroid on its Aspire netboo0k.

THE REALITY

Android is a complete software platform working with any number of hardware configurations. Its only cost to the manufacturer is the configuration programming to work on their laptop hardware plus the addition of the applications they wish to include. Once done there is no licensing fee to Google and

> the whole operating system can become proprietary.

Google's free Android operating system will be on the market in time for the Thanksqiving/Christmas shopping season. This will place it in direct competition with Microsoft's Windows in

the netbook arena.

Based on News Media reports: Acer, the world's second-largest laptop maker, will release an Android based Aspire One netbook in the third quarter. The Android-based Aspire One netbook will be cheaper than the Windows XP model, though the two products will have the same electronic components. Soon to follow will be other manufacturers Android-based netbooks on the market in the third quarter.

THE SUPPOSITION

Google Inc.'s free netbook operating system will grow in importance because:

The Android software is powerful enough to replace Windows, which runs about 90 percent of the world's personal computers.

Acer Inc., the world's second-largest laptop maker, will force other competitors to use Android to compete pricewise. Acer sells products under its four brands. Acer, Gateway Inc., eMachines and Packard Bell BV worldwide.

Google can provide developers with very strong financial backing.

PREVENTIVE MAINTENANCE GOOGLE'S ANDROID

Preventive Computer Maintenance

The single most important maintenance item that should be done on a regular basis is BACKUP YOUR DATA. What the schedule is depends on much data you can afford to lose. Try daily/weekly to an external hard drive and monthly to a CD/DVD, or use a backup application. Make sure that your software is updated; primarily the operating system and your primary browser.

Use utility software: get a sense of how your computer operates when it's operating correctly. For the Mac use 'Activity Monitor' or 'Tech Tools'. On the PC (in the control panel) administrative tools/performance. You can also check your internet connection speed at: http://reviews.cnet.com/internet-speedtest/?tag=ont.int.band

For the PC users--do regular spyware/virus scans. Make sure the definitions are up to date. Primarily for PC users--Defragment your hard drive (this may take a while). Mac users do not really need to do this since OS X (10.3 +) does it automatically.

Free up some space on your hard drive (PC users can use disk cleanup; Mac users can use CacheOutX). Clean out old files that you don't use, after you've backed them up. Uninstall those programs that you don't use. Apple recommends that you have at least 10% free, a bit more for PCs, this will iprove virtual memory and may improve disk performance.

It may provide developers with financial incentives to spur innovative applications such as the Androids Developers Challenge held in 2008 a contest with \$10,000,000 in prizes to develop over 50 of the most promising applications.

Google's popular Gmail will also be the icing on the cake.

Android may cause Microsoft to cut the price of Windows 7 which will ultimately compete with the free open source operating system.

As history has proved nothing in the computer world is a slam dunk but keep your eye on Android. It might be in your future.

Clean the Hardware -- to clean the monitor and keyboard use a dry microfiber cloth (be sure the computer is turned off) and gently (don't press hard) wipe the monitor, unplug the keyboard and wipe. If there are hard to clean areas, spray the cloth lightlywith a vinegar/water solution and then wipe. For an optical mouse wipe the bulb gently. You'll need to open a mechinal mouse to clean the rollers. Use a cotton swab with isopropyl alcohol.

If your computer case is easy to open (i.e. not an iMac or Mac Mini), then open it up (after shutting down and unplugging it) and use compressed air to blow out the dust. Do not use a vacuum since it may create a static charge that could damage the electronics. After closing the case you can clean out the fan in the back.

You'll also probably want to have the following tools:

message with "@username," where "username" is a Twitter ID. Maybe your friend Bob sent out a tweet complaining about the rain. You might respond with "@bob I agree!" Your message can be read by all of your followers, and it will show up on Bob's main page, as well as his @replies tab. You can send @replies to someone who does not follow you.

A more private type of communication is the direct message. Start a message using the format "d+space+username" (for example: "d bob where are you?"), and only that user will be able to see the message. Unlike @replies, you can send direct messages only to your followers.

Twitter is popular enough that it attracts some spam-like posts. We added some of Twitter's suggested users to our lineup and quickly found ourselves "followed" by several advertisers. You can protect your tweets by requiring your approval before anyone is allowed to follow you. Just click the Settings link and look toward the bottom of the Account tab for the checkbox. It's a good way to keep track of who's keeping track of you.

So just exactly what is Dropbox, you might ask? Have you ever needed to sync files between two or more machines? Have you wanted to also have an off-site copy of those files? Have you needed to sync files between Windows, Linux and Macintosh machines?


Have you wanted to have a public photo album to share pictures with your friends and family? Have

you needed a shared on-line file repository for collaborating with co-workers? Are you tired of carrying around a pocket full of thumb drives? Dropbox is all of these and even more. It is cross platform so it runs on Linux, Windows and Mac computers.

After installing the Dropbox application on one machine, you create an account and link that machine to the account. Then, any file that is placed in the My Dropbox folder (which in Windows lives inside the My Documents folder, and in Linux lives in your user

folder, the Linux equivalent of My Documents) gets automatically synced with your Dropbox folder on all other linked machines. This is what my Dropbox looks

like on my Ubuntu Linux machine:



If you only have Dropbox installed on one machine, it becomes an off-site backup service. Dropbox uses Amazon's S3 service behind the scenes to house your data. So files placed in

your Dropbox folder are automatically uploaded to the Dropbox servers.

Should you delete them on your local machine or suffer data loss, they can easily be retrieved from the Dropbox servers by installing Dropbox on a replacement machine, or

Directly from the Dropbox website.

Dropbox also supports shared folders that allow anyone you invite to the folder to have access to the files in that folder. This is a great way to collaborate and share files with coworkers. There's also a folder specifically configured to hold photos. Any images placed there are automatically turned into a photo album with a publicly accessible URL you can give out. There is also a Public folder that is accessible to anyone and a web interface that allows you to access files on machines that don't have Dropbox installed. Here's what my Dropbox homepage looks like:



You can then log your workouts and chart your progress. Those who have never tried it might falsely label Wii Fit as just another game, but it's a fun way for people of all ages, including families, to work toward healthy lifestyles.
